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
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IDEBIRIEFING

After completing the Denouement segment of the game, determine the mission's outcome using this manual. This is mandatory for Scenario 10, and for scenarios 7-9 too if you played Denouement. Do not use this manual unless you play Denouement.

Debriefing happens as a five stage narrative, each stage assessing how the mission was received by a particular stakeholder (the Army, for example, or the White House). Several steps are necessary to complete each stage. By the end of the process you should have a picture of the raid, its outcome, and implications for the future course of the war.

Procedure: Proceed through this manual in its entirety, page by page. Each has one or more sections posing questions about game play. Each "answer" may only be a positive or negative number, called a "Victory Point," a tool used to help gauge interpretation of the events. *For example, A1 on page 2 is asking about the fate of the bombers. How many are in Chungking? Historically there were 16 B-25s loaded onto the carrier deck and none made it to Chungking, so the answer would be "-5 VP.*" As you proceed, note the results on scratch paper, or use the Debriefing Log provided on the back of this booklet (you are welcome to copy it). Alternatively, you may find it helpful to use the 8.5"x11" player aid and VP markers (shown here), but that is optional.



Results: In many cases the VP number is associated with notes that expand on the results. The VP of each section is totaled together to generate a general measure of success pertaining to that section, and the stakeholder it represents. In some cases the result of one table or Debriefing section will influence the outcome of another. Historical results, where given, are boxed.

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1: **ARMY**

Determine how the Army's high command perceived the mission. It is concerned with the integrity of the squadron as a fighting force (the fate of its aircraft and its crews). It is also greatly interested in the effectiveness of the bombing.



If more than ten B-25s landed in China, he lobbies the Joint Chiefs of Staff to use this method of raid not only to wreak destruction over Japan, but to build up the Army's air assets in China. If Doolittle flew on the mission, Arnold writes a letter to President Roosevelt commending Doolittle's leadership, urging him to recommend the Medal of Honor.

⁵ 2: NAVY

The B-25s and its crews were carried and protected by the United States Navy. Determine how the Navy's high command perceived the mission and its cooperative experience with the Army. The high command is concerned mainly with the integrity of its force (the task force), the execution of its mission, and the destruction of targets of opportunity.

Tally the VP (Navy Ships, Mission Execution, and Targets of Opportunity) to derive a total. Use that total to assess the mood of Admiral Nimitz (in charge of the Pacific fleet).


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⁷ 3: JOINT CHIEFS

The Joint Chiefs of Staff was in a nascent state in April, and it had a lot riding on this mission. Back in December, President Roosevelt ordered an attack on Japan from the air, and very quickly it became a jointly planned operation. In particular, the Joint Chiefs are concerned about the security of the mission, the build up of Army bombers and crews in China against Japan, and the prospects of replicating this style of raid in the future. Is it feasible to load the army's medium bombers on an aircraft carrier and send it within launching distance of Tokyo? Does China now have the nucleus of a viable fighting air arm?

Tally the VP for Security, Build Up in China, and Raid Effectiveness. Use the total to assess the mood of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.





If the total Blast value on all target maps was 21 or more, the Joint Chiefs agree, after a spirited and contentious discussion, to divert Doolittle's squadron from its base in China to North Africa. The success of the mission indicated that assets can be soaked off from the Pacific. If that total is 20 or less, Doolittle is reassigned while his squadron gets to work pounding Japanese military targets in China and Burma.

4: WHITE HOUSE

President Roosevelt is keen to boost America's morale, looking for this raid to be the first good news of the five month old war. He is also concerned about the alliance with China and the Soviet Union (USSR). What effect will this raid have on his government's relationship with those two powers?

First, assess Roosevelt's mood as he interprets the news of the raid on the morale in the United States (Temperature at Home). Then, check the health of the United States' alliances with the Republic of China and the Soviet Union. Then, total all of the VP to find the President's overall assessment of the raid. Will he give his Shangri-la speech If the result is "encouraged" or better, he does.

"Shangri-la" is a fictitious place imagined by novelist James Hilton in his 1930s best seller, Lost Horizon. He described it as a strange valley lost to the world, where war is not known and its inhabitants lead blissful lives lasting centuries.

In the coming months author James Hilton, now working for Frank Capra in Hollywood, is unexpectedly delighted to receive increased royal- ties for his book <i>Lost Horizon</i> .
elated	President Roosevelt's fireside chat is positively animated, and radio broadcasters follow suit. If Doolittle survived the mission, he and a handful of other airmen spend months touring stateside. Honored and decorated as heroes, they sell war bonds.
triumphant	Radio broadcasters offer hyperbolic pronouncements about the war having turned around. Even the usually restrained print journalist Walter Lippman refers to the Tokyo Raid as a decisive blow. President Roosevelt's next three fireside chats are distinctly positive, but he concludes each with a cautious note: "This war is far from over. There is much work yet to accomplish."

5: **JAPAN**

Even before the raid on Pearl Harbor, Japan's Navy General Staff and the leaders of the Combined Fleet had bitterly debated the wisest course of strategy. Should it focus on prized targets in the south thus garnering vital resources such as rubber, petroleum, and rice, or should it finish off the United States' Pacific Fleet? That debate continued into April, 1942, just as American bombers launched against Japan. This section of Debriefing explores the Doolittle Raid's influence on the Navy General Staff's debate over strategy. Historically, the plan to lure American carriers into decisive battle by threatening the installation at Midway had been approved on April 16.

First, check the mood at the Imperial Palace in Tokyo. The sum (of Army VP total and four questions below) will provide a rough assessment that is used to answer several questions on the following pages. Then, determine the Imperial Japanese Navy's next likely move in the Pacific.

The wail of the air raid siren finally cycles off. Most people on the streets in Tokyo ignored it as usual, and hours later some are surprised to hear on the radio that the Americans actually attempted to attack the capital. Admiral Yamamoto Isoroku reads the report but says nothing to his aid. His staff will debate the Admiral's plan to wipe out the American carrier fleet enthusiastically for days, preparing for the next Imperial Conference. Roll a die: if EVEN, the Admiral bides his time and refrains from urging his Pearl Harbor plan again. If ODD, a zealous adjutant forwards it to Imperial General Headquarters and is soundly berated afterward.

- **Outrage** Emperor Hirohito listens as his ministers explain how the damage was minimal. Bombs have never fallen on Japanese soil before. With irony and an unexpected sense of panic, he thinks of his father's elation at the news from the great sea victory in 1905. Now, in the evening after the raid, the Prime Minister offers assurances. If the Blast Value in Tokyo West is 5 or higher (including Target Boxes), roll a die: if EVEN, the Emperor can only think to ask about repairs to the Imperial Palace and is assured they will be handled discretely. If ODD, he inquires about a plan to deal with the United States fleet. Admiral Yamamoto is summoned to the palace.
 - **doubt** Karusu Saburo, chief architect of the Tripartite Pact, has just embarked from Rio De Janeiro. His long route home from Washington, where he had delivered his country's declaration of war on the afternoon of December 7, will not bring him to Yokohama until August. He hears the news of the raid on the radio with deep regret. He does not need to read the details that will come forth in the coming weeks to know that this is only the beginning. Meanwhile, in Tokyo, air raid sirens are taken seriously. Few can look up at the sky anymore as planes fly by without feeling a sense of dread.
 - **shock** Konoe Fumimaro watches the commotion on the street as he catches a sympathetic aid on his way to the Imperial Palace. Having stepped down as Prime Minister back in October, he no longer has access to Tojo's office or his staff, and he can only imagine how the new Prime Minister will explain this to the Emperor.
 - **horror** Prime Minister Tojo Hideki confers with staff at the War Guidance Office and is quick to acknowledge the Navy's culpability. If Tokyo West has a Blast Value of 2 or more (not counting Target Boxes), roll a die: if EVEN, the Imperial Palace was damaged and Tojo will confer with the Emperor at the War Ministry. If ODD, Tojo rails against Admiral Oikawa Koshiro, Navy Minister, before the Emperor at the palace, insisting that the Navy is not taking the menace to the east seriously (shift the result of J12 one box to the left). In either case, for days, people in Tokyo will look at planes in the sky with great trepidation. When will the Americans return?

If two or more answers are "yes," or if all are "yes" and "probably," the Japanese military conducts a three month campaign to capture air strips robbing the Chinese and their American allies the opportunity to launch raids against Japan from China. This campaign will also involve the destruction of villages and towns nearby, and the deaths of civilians. Historically, over 200,000 died.

If the Japanese conduct an offensive to capture landing sites, the Haverson Project (known as Special Aviation Project Number Two), will be scratched by the U.S. Army, diverting the squadron known as Halpro to North Africa, where it will make the first raid on oil refineries at the Romanian city of Ploiesti in August, 1942. If the Japanese do not conduct an offensive to capture landing sites, Halpro will continue to China as planned, joining the 10th Air Force. Comprised of twenty B-24 heavy bombers, they will use those landing sites to raid industrial cities in Japan. If two results are "maybe" the Japanese conduct an offensive to capture landing sites after Halpro's Tokyo raid later in the year.

Japan and the Soviet Union shared a Neutrality Pact, preventing either nation from taking up arms against the other. This was mutually beneficial. For Japan, it meant its Army could focus on China and Burma and not fight a second front to the north. For the Soviets, it meant it could focus on the rather alarming German invasion on its western border, without worrying about fighting the Japanese on its eastern border. Historically, the pact lasted until 1945.

- **Yes** Admiral Yamamoto Isoroku's approved plan to lure U.S. carrier assets into battle by threatening Midway Island (Operation MI) is reviewed again by Prime Minister Tojo. If the total Blast Value on the Tokyo Target Map is 16 or more, roll two dice: if their sum is **10 or higher**, the Admiral is instructed to draft up a plan to attack Pearl Harbor instead, in preparation for an invasion of Hawaii. If **9 or less**, that more ambition plan is shelved until after implementation of the Coral Sea operation (Operation MO), to be conducted simultaneously with MI.
- **Maybe** Admiral Yamamoto's plan is hotly debated once again. Roll a die: if EVEN, despite threatening to resign, Yamamoto's plan is shelved (roll two more dice: if their sum is 12, the Admiral actually resigns). If ODD, the plan is finally put into motion, but only after Operation MO.
 - **NO** The Combined Fleet will concentrate its forces on the project to isolate Australia (Operation MO). Until further developments reveal the situation has changed, the U.S. carrier fleet is deemed a manageable threat and the Midway plan is put on hold.
